ABOUT THIS RESOURCE

The following activities can be used with students of all ages. It's at the teacher's discretion to decide what is appropriate for their specific group of students. For these reasons, common core standards have not been included.

READING AND WRITING GUIDE

- (A) When Zebra finally gets his answer, he realizes he is a Zebra with black AND white stripes. He does not have to fit in one category or another. Many of us come from mixed cultural backgrounds and may be able to relate to Zebra's question.
 - ★ Think about your **stripes**. You may talk about stripes that represent your cultural background or something different. What pulls you in two different directions? Do you ever feel like you have to choose between one and the other? What if you chose both?
 - ★ Think of a different animal in the savanna. How would this animal respond to Zebra's question? Write and illustrate a page to show the dialogue between this new animal and Zebra.
- (B) Zebra has an important question on his mind and he asks his friends for help. They respond in a variety of ways. Some of them are willing to help and others are bothered by Zebra's request for help. Use a **Venn diagram** to help you compare and contrast the animals' responses.

Discussion questions:

- ★ Which animal was most helpful to Zebra?
- ★ Compare Butterfly's answer to Lion's answer. Butterfly said Zebra was both black and white, but it depended on what side you are looking at. How is Butterfly's perspective different from Lion's? Which will make Zebra happier?

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STEAM ACTIVITIES

Make a **KWL chart** about animals in the African savanna. What other animals might Zebra have encountered? Would any of them scare Zebra like the lion did?

- ★ Draw a picture of your favorite animal in the savanna. Label the animal and the parts of its habitat.
- ★ Zebra is asking for the animals' opinion about whether he is a black zebra with white stripes or a white zebra with black stripes. Make a **chart** to list five facts about the savanna and five opinions.

SEL ACTIVITIES

- ★ Have you ever asked for help? What kind of response did you get? Was it similar to one of the animals in the story? How did it make you feel?
- ★ When others ask you for help, how do you usually respond? Are you like one of the animals in the story? What kinds of things determine the way you respond?
- ★ Research the nine different personalities of the Enneagram. Which personality does Zebra represent? What personalities do the other animals represent?


